










## Nominations for the Carterton District Council Water Race Committee 2024-2027

<p><b>John Bertram BOOTH</b> Taratahi Water Race</p> <p>I am standing to represent you on the Water Race Committee as I believe my experience as a farmer and an elected member on the Carterton District from 2010 to 2019 can be used to our advantage as we navigate the future of this very valuable resource to us. I have chaired the committee in the past and have very good relationships with council management and staff, which is crucial for the operation and the longevity of our water source. The continuing process of renewing our resource consent with GWRC needs to be finalised, and I intend to see this completed if elected to the committee. Water to our farms and blocks is crucial for our future. It is no longer a given that the water is going to be available in the future. We need strong voices to make sure it is, and I will represent you all to see that we have that water.</p>	
<p><b>John Douglas McFADZEAN</b> Taratahi and Carrington Water Race</p> <p>I take the role of representing you very seriously, and am at all times aware of the trust you are putting in all elected representatives to ensure that the water-race system is maintained and managed economically, enhancing its unique status as part of the eco-system. At present our role is to (1) Make sure that the water race system is not complicated or compromised by the bureaucracy. (2) Get back from CDC a massive 4-year administration overcharge (water race ratepayers' money). (3) Ensure that all ratepayers are provided with clean running water 365 days of the year. As in previous years, if elected, I will endeavour to represent you to the best of my ability.</p>	
<p><b>Thomas Wilhelm GRASENACK</b> Taratahi Water Race</p> <p>I have been a New Zealand resident since 1984. I moved from Wellington to Carterton and have been a ratepayer since July 2010. The land was bought mainly because of the water race flowing through it. At that time there were no trees on the two-hectare property, just grass for raising cattle. Water was key for the purchase, as was the case when the water race system was established, and it look as though it will be even more important in the future. I am told that the race system was established around a hundred years ago, time enough to evolve into much more than just a conveyor of water to drench the thirst of stock. It now forms a biotope of its own and many other life forms have become to depend on it. In hot and dry summers more households have a need for the water as well. The water race system deserves all the care it can get.</p>	
<p><b>David John EADE</b> Taratahi Water Race</p> <p>Age 61. Occupation – handyman. I have lived in the Wairarapa for the past 10 years and been in New Zealand for the last 20 years. <b>Michael SCOTT</b>	Carrington Water Race	
<p>We purchased our property 7 years ago and have made extensive use of the Carrington water race system for stock water and irrigating hundreds of native trees. I have a set of skills and experience that would bring a fresh approach and thinking. I have extensive experience in local government having previously worked for Wellington City Council for 20-years in multiple senior positions. For the last 6 years I have consulted to local government on 3 waters infrastructure strategy specifically in Porirua City. At the forefront of thinking was the need to fit within fiscal constraints while balancing the increasing pressures around climate change, legislative requirements and community expectations.
